Who owns the energy sector in Uzbekistan?

The government owns and manages the energy sector in Uzbekistan. The Joint Stock Company-Uzbekenergo, a vertically integrated and publicly owned monopoly (in charge of electricity generation, transmission, and distribution), operates under the supervision and regulation of the Cabinet of Ministers.

Solar panels are installed on the roofs of many state buildings in Uzbekistan. The country aims to maximise its solar energy usage in the years to come. "This is the competitiveness of the economy, first of all, because tomorrow we need a green certificate, a green component of our products.

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2018; Uzbekistan has increased its solar and wind power targets in an effort to help meet the country's growing energy demands after failing to bring more natural gas to the domestic market.

Through a development and cooperation agreement with Uzbekistan's Ministry of Energy, the aim of the two projects is to develop large-scale solar photovoltaic ("PV") plants and battery energy storage systems ("BESS") in Uzbekistan.

Uzbekistan is making strides in renewable energy, aiming to exceed 18,000 MW of solar and wind capacity by 2030, which will enable the country to generate 40% of its electricity from sustainable sources, save billions of cubic meters of natural gas, and reduce harmful emissions.

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Since 2021, Uzbekistan has commissioned ten green power plants, including nine solar and one wind, with a combined capacity exceeding 2,500 megawatts, as part of its broader effort to shift towards renewable energy and reduce fossil fuel dependency.

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Uzbekistan remains one of the most energy-intensive economies in the world. Energy use is largely based on fossil fuels, although the country has significant RE potential in solar and wind. Natural gas makes up to 83 percent of total primary energy consumption and more than 80 percent of the electricity mix.

Uzbekistan is looking to have more than 20 GW of renewable energy capacity by the end of the decade and to increase the share of renewables in the energy balance to 40%, President Shavkat Mirziyoyev stated on Thursday.
